Private Bradley Manning, a 23-year-old US Army intelligence analyst, stands accused of leaking the largest amount of classified information in American history to the whistleblower website WikiLeaks.org.

The materials include a video that the US military had refused to release showing American troops shooting Iraqi civilians – including two journalists with camera equipment – from a helicopter, as well as State Department cables that helped bring transparency to governments and spark democratic uprisings in the Middle East and the war logs that have brought us the truth about war crimes committed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Manning has now been charged with "aiding the enemy," a capital offense, and faces life in prison without parole.

The whistleblower behind the Vietnam War era's Pentagon Papers, Daniel Ellsberg, has called him a "hero" and was recently arrested for protesting his detention at the military prison in Quantico, VA where Manning was being held.

the charges

>> Manning was held without charge for months before receiving charges of transferring classified data onto his computer and communicating national defense information to an unauthorized source.

>> 22 more charges were brought against him in March 2011, including the extreme "aiding the enemy" charge, which is punishable by death or life in prison without parole.

>> Manning was held for almost a year in solitary confinement without hearing. His first hearing has yet to be announced.

the leaks

>> The leaked material includes over 250,000 US State Department diplomatic cables.

>> The "Collateral Murder" video released by WikiLeaks in April 2010 shows Apache helicopter gunsight footage of the July 12, 2007 Baghdad airstrike, in which US troops fired on and killed Iraqi civilians.

the torture

>> Manning has been subjected to what amounts to CIA "no-touch" torture techniques, including sleep deprivation, prolonged isolation and being forced to strip naked.

>> Manning's treatment in detention has sparked investigations by the UN and Amnesty International. Manning was moved to a medium-security facility in Leavenworth, KS in April 2011.
